Camp Bullis Sentinel Landscape: A New Frontier in Public-Private Land Conservation and Stewardship

Over the past 18 months, Hill Country Alliance and the Alamo Area Council of Governments have built a coalition of nearly 40 partner organizations and agencies focused on enhancing coordination and collaborative conservation in the southern Hill Country that is anchored around Joint Base San Antonio - Camp Bullis. The partners recently submitted a proposal to the Sentinel Landscape Program, which would help accelerate land and water conservation, habitat enhancement, and night sky preservation to support natural resources, communities in several counties, and the Camp Bullis training mission.
